

BIG CATS of Western India

24 DAYS For wildlife-lovers, nothing is as alluring as the big cats of India. This journey takes us deep inside India's western wilderness. The region is highly diverse, with unique landscapes that are primarily dry and arid, dominated by the Thar Desert. Along with the desert are enchanting dry deciduous forests, shrubland, vast savanna grasslands and endless saltpans.

A huge variety of wildlife live here, including three of the four Big Cats in the country – the Asiatic Lion, Bengal Tiger and Indian Leopard. We also have the opportunity to see four kinds of canids on this trip – Indian Wolf, Striped Hyena, Bengal Fox and Jackal. Along with these predators are other mammals such as the Asiatic Wild ass, blackbuck, spotted deer, sambhar deer and many more. Western India is also an essential destination on the Central Asian flyway and thousands of migratory birds congregate in the water bodies, making it an

absolute goldmine for birders. The arid saltpans are dotted with lakes that are breeding grounds for flamingos, cranes and pelicans and a number of raptors.

This region is also home to some of the most elaborate architecture in the country. See the intricately

carved marble of Jain Temple Hutheesing and witness the legacy of Jaipur's feudal rulers on a sightseeing trail through the "pink city". Throughout your journey, be

welcomed by warm and colourful people who make India such a fascinating place to travel. Come with us, as we peel back the different layers of India for you.



NEW GUINEA & INDONESIA Ponant Expedition MAR 2024

17 DAYS Board the ship in Cairns and Le Lapérouse will sail for Papua New Guinea, a fascinating land that is home to no fewer than 700 ethnic groups within a highly diverse yet mainly unexplored ecosystem. Your call at Tufi will be one of the highlights of your voyage. Dubbed the Scandinavia of the Tropics, you will undoubtedly fall under the charm of this picturesque region, with its deep 'fjords' known locally as 'rias', which were formed through volcanic activity. In this unique setting, local Papuan tribes will share their customs, beliefs and artwork with you.

We'll then head north along the coast to Madang, nicknamed 'the most beautiful city in the South Pacific'. Within this stunning province exists great geographical diversity and 170 different languages are spoken. Its festival showcases this richness and offers colourful traditional performances or 'sing sings' by many of the cultural groups of the province. These include the mysterious Asaro Mudmen, who re-enact a warrior episode from their history, wearing masks of mud, their bodies coated in clay. In the village of Kopar, situated at the mouth of the Sepik River, you will be welcomed with cultural performances and witness life in a traditional village. As you voyage across Western New Guinea you will experience Cenderawasih Bay, with an unforgettable opportunity to swim with whale sharks and in the spectacular Kitikiti Waterfall, surrounded by lush nature. You will then set sail towards the Kei Islands, located in the Maluku Islands.

These hidden gems surrounded by unbelievably blue water boast some of the most beautiful white-sand beaches in Indonesia. Before ending your cruise in Darwin, you will sail to the heart of Triton Bay. Located

within a protected marine environment in the middle of the Coral Triangle, you will enjoy an unforgettable zodiac cruise through the spectacular rainforestcapped karst islands.



Korea is a photographer's dream. There's also history galore. Much of Korea was ruled by the Joseon dynasty which lasted for over 500 years until the late 1800s. They left a mark which you'll find right in the heart of Seoul with the Gyeongbokgung Palace built in the 14th century. Learn about this and see what "K pop" culture, kimchi and Gangnam Style is all about!





Unlike its neighbours Japan and China, Korea is not a popular tourist destination for Australians. In fact, apart from its capital Seoul, You'll notice in some places, European people may even be stared at. Locals

DAYS The subtropical island of Taiwan is small, yet even with its population of 23 million, it doesn't feel crowded. Taiwan's indigenous

tribes - of which there are ten officially recognised by today's government - are believed to have Polynesian ancestors, not Chinese. Having been ruled by the Dutch, Han Chinese and Japanese, Taiwan's culture is an interesting mix. Taipei, the modern, efficient capital, has wonderful food and café culture - if you like your dumplings, you've come to the right place! Taiwan is known as the "Beautiful Isle", and outside of Taipei, you'll find towering sea cliffs, dramatic gorges, tropical forests and mountains. We visit the beautiful Sun Moon Lake, the quaint village of Lukang known for its handicrafts and the scenic coastline of Tarako National Park.

For a small country, Romania has a large population - around the same as our own at 23

million. It is surrounded by Bulgaria, Serbia, Hungary, Ukraine and Moldova with a small stretch of the Black Sea preventing it from being landlocked. Much of its landscape is picturesque with the Carpathian Mountains occupying the centre of the country.

There is a lot to see and do in this mainly Christian Orthodox country. The region of Transylvania is well known for its castles, churches and beautiful forested mountains. Around 30% of the country's workers are employed in agriculture. The quality of their wines has increased dramatically over the years, so much so, they are selling it all over Europe! The cities in the Transylvania region will surprise you with their cosmopolitan feel and beauty.

Georgia has an ancient culture and a unique alphabet found nowhere else in the world. The capital, Tbilisi will surprise you with its modern, very European café style society. Yet, leave the city and you may feel like you are travelling in medieval times. Tourists (not that there are that many) visit mainly for the scenic beauty of the higher Caucasus Mountain range, the highest point of which is over 5,000 metres.

The Caucasus – AZERBAIJAN, GEORGIA & ARMENIA


Azerbaijan, considered a moderate Muslim nation, also boasts an ancient culture with a history dating back to prehistoric times. Stoneage settlements are still evident. Most neighbours came, made their mark and then left at some stage. For many years, her economy has been based around the abundance of oil and gas reserves. The capital, Baku, could be considered a rich and dynamic city.

The Republic of Armenia, a landlocked country in the Lower Caucasus, i s a very small country at less than half the size of our own Tasmania and with a population of less than 3 million. Like Georgia, it is a Christian country with an ancient history. Armenia has the distinction of having the oldest Christian cathedral in the world!

Tourism is growing as infrastructure and services improve. The countryside is beautiful with the jewel being the Alpine Lake Sevan at almost 2,000 metres above sea level – one of the largest freshwater alpine lakes in the world. These three countries should be high on your list of must-see destinations.

13 DAYS Whatever your perceptions of Iceland may be, they are possibly off the mark, or at least dated, as this small North Sea nation keeps on reinventing itself. Iceland is often called the Land of Ice and Fire. Its spectacular natural landscapes showcase the ancient geothermal forces have been at work for thousands of years. Iceland is known for its volcanoes, glaciers, fjordlands, mountains, lava fields, waterfalls, and hot springs. The island's interior is a cold and uninhabitable combination of sand, mountains, and lava fields.

From humble Nordic origins it has become one of Europe's leading eco-paradises, boasting the largest national park in the European Union – Vatnajökull where you'll discover pristine streams full of salmon, trails through glaciers, five-gaited Icelandic horses running wild, and bubbling pools of mud and sulphur to heal the body and mind. Many things in Iceland remain exactly as the Vikings found them around 1,100 years ago, especially the raw and dramatic glacial fjords.

At about 100,000 square kilometres, Iceland is small – with a population of just 350,000 making it the most sparsely populated country in Europe. At 43.5 hours per week, they have the longest work week in Europe. The Icelandic language remains unchanged

from ancient Norse. Iceland is warmed by the Gulf Stream and has a temperate climate, despite a high latitude just outside the Arctic Circle. Its high latitude and marine influence keep summers chilly, with most of the archipelago having a tundra climate. The major city & capital is Reykjavík which lies on the south west. Akureyri, a lovely city with great food and gardens, is the capital of northern Iceland.

Push through pack ice to find walrus and bearded seals, or simply enjoy the breathtakingly beautiful Norwegian fjords.

GREENLAND (IIulissat)

5 DAYS The Nordic settler Eric the Red gave Greenland this misleading description of it being green, in a bid to attract more settlers. However, it is far from being green and is in effect the world's largest island and almost entirely covered in ice. It also has the lowest population density of any country/ state. The scenery could only be described as stunning but words don't do it justice.

For around 4,500 years, Inuit pioneers and adventurers have been drawn here, summoned by the northern lights, and to do battle with ice crevasses and polar bears. These days it's more about enjoyment: deep sea fishing, whale-watching (20 species of whale – notably fin, humpback and minke), Arctic cruising, dog-sledding, mountaineering, bird-watching (especially white-tailed eagles with wingspans of 2.5 metres), and marauding herds of musk ox. Sadly, we can't guarantee you will spot them all, but looking is half the fun.

Blue Dot Travel's Greenland tour with 4 nights in Ilulissat is planned to run in conjunction with our June 2024 Arctic expedition cruise to Svalbard.

THE FAROE ISLANDS DEPARTS

5 DAYS The Faroe Islands are not on many Australians' travel list. They should be because they are a hidden treasure! Every village seems to be perched on the most picturesque bay overlooking the Atlantic. The houses are quaint. There are waterfalls at every turn. Salmon is abundant. There are sheep everywhere and their wool makes fabulous jumpers – famous in many parts of Europe.

The early history of the rugged and rocky Faroe Islands is shrouded in as much mist as mystery, but it was probably settled by Norsemen in the 800s, who introduced the area's signature sheep and goats. While once a Norwegian asset, these fishing islands have been under Danish control/ support since 1388. Having said that, The Faroe Islands is a separate self-governing state. The 18 islands of Faroe are roughly halfway between Great Britain and Iceland with a population of around 50,000 people. The official language is Faroese which is a Germanic language that descended from Old Norse. Since they are within the Kingdom of Denmark, the locals generally converse in Danish, but most also speak English.

Absence of other distractions has led to a strong music culture here, with hearty music festivals in summer. Despite its remote location, The Faroe Islands has excellent infrastructure. A number of tunnels make it easy to

traverse the mountain ranges, and a further two connect the islands. Between navigable roadways and its small size, The Faroe Islands create an unforgettable road trip with extraordinary views at every turn.

UGANDA IN-DEPTH with Tanzania Extensio

19 DAYS If you like close encounters with wildlife, friendly people and stunning scenery, Uganda might just be the best place to visit in all of Africa. In fact, this wonderful country offers the complete African wildlife experience with the added bonus of the gorillas. There are 10 national parks covering a significant percentage of the countryside. In the North East, you can spot the big cats, the savannah animals and an amazing variety of birdlife. Down west you'll see a plethora of elephants, hippos, chimps and more. And then there's the mountain gorillas. Sadly, there are only about 900 of these majestic primates left in the wild but you are highly likely to see them in their natural habitat on this tour.

Put simply, Uganda offers a wildlife experience second to none. However, its not all about the wildlife.

Churchill was right...Uganda is the pearl of Africa! With stunning scenery, much of the country is on a plateau which ascends to over 5,100 metres on Mount Stanley in the south – the 3rd highest peak in Africa. The landscape is a combination of jungle, grasslands and land that has been cleared for farming. Uganda shares Lake Victoria – the largest tropical lake in the world – as its eastern border with Kenya and Tanzania. Uganda is a land

locked nation about the size of Victoria. It is predominantly a Christian country with 80% of the 30 million people being of Christian faith.

The West first took real notice of Uganda in the early 70s when the dictator Idi Amin took power. Dubbed "the butcher of Uganda", Amin was a military official who, after seizing power, was responsible for the expulsion and murder of hundreds of thousands of people – namely any one who did not agree with his ways. He died in exile in 2003. Today, the country is at peace. Visitors are attracted by the gorillas which are protected from poachers around the clock. While the recent past of this struggling nation cannot be ignored, it is well and truly open for business. You will be greatly rewarded by visiting. Not just for the gorillas, but also for the people, the magnificent scenery and the culture.


18 DAYS Wedged between Argentina and Brazil, the small nation of Uruguay is often overlooked by travellers on their tours of South America. This makes it the ideal place to experience everyday 'not made for tourists' moments. Whether it's strolling the cobbled streets of UNESCO-listed Colonia, or sipping maté in the cosmopolitan capital Montevideo, the laid back culture welcomes travellers. Uruguay's boutique-style wine country is making its mark on the global map and must be enjoyed alongside delicious picada, a traditional snack.

Even further off the "gringo trail", at the heart of the continent, is the landlocked country of Paraguay. The capital, Asuncion, is the ideal place to learn about the history and culture of the region with its many museums and galleries. Yet just beyond the city, you may feel as though you have stepped back in time, visiting artisans' workshops set against a rural backdrop. It is a country of contrasts and one that not many of your friends will have visited.

Celebrated for its colourful history, fascinating customs, and jawdropping landscapes it's easy to see why Bolivia and travel are a match made in heaven. Over 60 percent of Bolivia's population is of indigenous descent, with a further 30 percent from mixed indigenous and European origins, making it the most indigenous country on the continent. There are wonderful Incan ruins to be explored, yet the Spanish colonisation can still be strongly felt: the "white city" of Sucre is a UNESCO-listed site. The phenomenal Salt Flats are a photographer's dream and must-do experience in Bolivia. So too is the monumental Lake Titicaca, the world's highest navigable body of water at 3,800 metres above sea level, its waters reflecting the Andes ranges. If you're looking for the things that South America is known for – ancient Incan ruins, colonial architecture, UNESCO-listed sites, and epic landscapes – in the places lesser travelled, this is the trip for you.

MOROCCO DEPARTS SEP 2024

23 DAYS Morocco. Just saying it conjures up the aroma of delicious tagines, images of bustling souks, snow-capped mountains, medinas (ancient walled cities) and camels. It is all of these things and so much more. The Kingdom of Morocco is about twice the size of Victoria and sits on the North East Atlantic coast of Africa with the Mediterranean Sea directly north. Its location on the continent, coupled with its resources, meant it received much attention from European powers over the centuries: Portugal, Spain and France have all played their part with the latter claiming Morocco as a protectorate state from 1912-1956 (Treaty of Fez). The Western Sahara (once Spanish) remains a highly contentious area in the deep south where the local, mainly indigenous Sahrawians, reject Morocco's sovereignty over this vast desert region.

Many people think Morocco is mostly desert however, there are fertile valleys, oasis gorges, vast cedar forests and much of the country is mountainous – the Atlas Range averages over 3,500m and the highest peaks are snow covered for much of the year. Casablanca is the largest city of Rabat has around 1.6 million inhabitants. Ninety nine percent of the population are Sunni Muslims of Arab, Berber or Arab/Berber ancestry. There is a very small Christian and even smaller Jewish population that have had some influence on the region. Morocco is famous for its arts and crafts – pottery, metalware, leather goods and rugs can be found in almost every souk and shopping always involves haggling over the price. Our tour of Morocco will cover off the must-sees along with plenty of lesser travelled destinations. It is a comprehensive itinerary which covers

most regions.



CORSIGA, SARDINIA, MALTA 24 DAYS Sardinian towns and cities, DEPARTS SEP 2024



24 DAYS If year-round sunshine and 7,000 yearsworth of living history is your

thing, Malta should be on your travel bucket list. This independent nation – an ex British colony – comprises three small Islands – Malta, Gozo and Comino which is uninhabited. It is a traveller's dream because you can take in everything within a small radius, sampling the architecture (both grand and quaint), a stunning fortified harbour, the rocky landscape, traditional hilltop towns, fishing villages, and an upbeat lively capital city, all against

the languid backdrop of the magnificent Mediterranean.

Sardinia is the second largest island in the Mediterranean, presenting a rather rugged mountain

scape, balanced by placid bays. In rural parts, stone-walled Neolithic fortresses call Nuraghes can still be seen in the fields. Sardinian towns and cities. especially those along the coast, have a rich tradition of shellfish and seafood while inland towns and cities are known for game and farm produce, most notably its capers, olives and pecorino sardo. 

The hi-tech speed and efficiency of the bullet train will whisk you from Tokyo to the serenity of Kyoto's zen gardens in less than three hours, where temples and culture surround you. Be moved by the tragic history of Hiroshima and the sacred island of Miyajima. Step back in time in the UNESCO-listed township of Shirakawago with its thatched roof houses and immerse yourself in ancient culture with the Taiko drummers of Sado Island. Blue Dot's engaged style of travel means that we will give you every opportunity to meet Japanese people. The first thing you'll notice

about the locals is how polite they are. The second thing you'll notice is that English is not commonly spoken or understood and as a result, there is a lot of bowing and smiling without many words being spoken. Practice your "Ohay gozaimasu" (good morning) and "konichiwa" (good afternoon) as it will go a long way.

This three week tour will give you the opportunity to experience the many different aspects which make Japan such a unique and fascinating country.

14 DAYS After the first visit to Japan, many of us come back feeling that we barely scratched the surface. This itinerary allows you to delve deeper into the lesser travelled, but equally rewarding side of Japan in the Tohoku region, the Northern area on the main island Honshu.

Very few western travellers visit the Tohuku region, so the experience is akin to visiting Japan 30 years ago before tourism exploded in the major cities. We'll visit small traditional villages like the mountainous hot spring village of Nyuto Onsen, with its collection of rustic wooden buildings and Ouchi-juku, a collection of traditional thatched buildings from the Edo Period, both dating back 300 years.

This region is rich in Samurai history and we'll visit authentic samurai residences where the direct descendants of the samurai families still live. It is also home to some of Japan's original castles with excellent examples Hirosaki and Tsuruga. As one of the least densely populated areas of Japan, Tohoku is known for its beautiful mountainous scenery, virgin beech forests, volcanic peaks and lakes. We'll enjoy gentle hiking at Goshikinuma, a cluster of five volcanic lakes, each with its unique colour ranging from reddish-green to cobalt blue; and at Shirakami Sanchi, the largest virgin beech forest in East Asia, and a UNESCO-listed area. In fact, this region is home to three UNESCO-listed sites, the most impressive being the vast array of temples in Nikko, where 103 of the buildings and structures as well as their natural setting has been declared a World Heritage site.

On our travels, we'll stay in a mix of hotels and traditional Ryokans, some with naturally occurring hot spring baths on site. Come and join us for a step away from modern life, to wander amongst breathtaking natural beauty and to gain a fantastic insight into Japanese history, culture and traditional customs.

27 DAVS On this fascinating tour, we visit the historically intertwined countries of Vietnam and Cambodia, taking in bustling metropolis cities, ancient kingdoms, world heritage sites, and the spectacular beauty of Halong Bay and the Mekong Delta.

Travelling with Blue Dot you'll experience these fascinating cultures from many unique perspectives, with 8 days spent onboard a boutique river cruise on the Mekong Delta, a slow-paced rail journey into the mountains and a delightful cruise into Ha Long Bay. Of course, we will also spend time on land amidst the beautiful people of these countries. With its intriguing history, terraced rice fields, floating markets, French-influenced food, and scenic waterways, Vietnam has so much to offer the traveller. As a communist country, Vietnam has no official religion, but people are free to worship if they want to, and many follow what's called the "Three Teachings" of Confucianism, Taoism and Buddhism.



Two of Vietnam's largest rivers, the Mekong in the south and the Red in the north, end at the South China Sea in a huge swampy delta. These regions are home to much of the country's population and provide fertile ground to grow rice and crops. On this journey, we will cruise the serene waters of both the delta and UNESCO World Heritage listed Halong Bay in northeast Vietnam, which consists of more than 1,600 islands and inlets. We'll also visit the fascinating hill tribes and villages around Sapa, enjoy the lively colour and markets of Hanoi and explore the bustling Ho Chi Minh City.



Cambodia is about twice the size of Tasmania and has a population of over 14 million. From the 9th to the 15th century, the country was the centre of the Khmer Empire. It became a French protectorate in 1863 and then part of French Indochina a few years later. The decades following their independence in 1953 were nothing short of turbulent. The People of Cambodia have emerged from their turbulent past with what can only be described as an unbreakable spirit. They will leave their impression on you as equally as their most famous tourist attraction, the stunning temples of Angkor Wat.

With a population who are 95% Buddhist, the religious sites and temples are of the best in Indochina, whilst their major cities of Phnom Penh and Siem Reap are chaotic and charismatic. Physically, the country is picturesque with



JORDAN & OMAN with Saudi Arabia Extension

20 D/AYS The Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan is a small, landlocked nation with the exception of a tiny section of The Red Sea. It is mainly desert with around half of the country's population living in the capital, Amman. Most of the population are of Bedouin origin, and Arabic is the official language. Ancient Semitic settlements more than 4,000 years old have been identified by archaeologists around the Jordan River. Since then, all the major powers of the region invaded at some stage, yet Jordan remains a safe haven within the region. Known for their hospitality, Jordanians have welcomed travellers for centuries. Wadi Rum and Petra are the two best-known attractions but the country offers far more than this.


Oman is an independent sultanate on the Arabian peninsula. Covering a strategic location on the Arabian Sea, Oman was coveted by the great powers which came and went. In the late 1400s the Portuguese occupied much of the territory including the capital, Muscat. Almost 100 years later, The Ottomans drove them out and occupied the region for some 100 years. The Persians also came and went briefly. Since 1741, it has been self-governing. The country occupies just over 300,000 square km and has a population of over 4 million, with the overwhelming majority being of Islamic faith. Oman is not widely travelled to by Westerners, yet offers a rich heritage and stunning natural beauty. Muscat, Oman's port capital, sits on the Gulf of Oman surrounded by mountains and desert. With history dating back to antiquity, it mixes modern high-rises with 16th-century landmarks and the impressive Sultan Qaboos Grand Mosque. Beyond the capital, desert oasis and UNESCO-listed sites form the backdrop for the ancient Frankincense trade route.

Saudi Arabia is an undiscovered, culturally rich destination that is completely off the tourist trail. It is home to Mecca and Medina, and is laden with World Heritage sites. Be one of our first travellers to discover this emerging destination, on our 6 day Saudi Arabia extension.

Perched on the Atlantic Coast between Brazil and Venezuela, each of these countries offer something very special and,

as very few travellers visit these nations, they come with huge bragging rights! While they are all part of The Guyana Shield (the greater Amazon Basin), they differ in that they were colonised by different European cultures who have all left their mark. They each provide indigenous culture with Amerindian history, along with colonial history – mainly Dutch, French and English but the Spanish and Portuguese were also there at some stage. African slave labour was used across the region and a strong Indian and Javanese influence is evident resulting from the plantations of sugar and other crops. Add the distinctly Caribbean feel and you have a melting pot of people, like no other. 80% of the region is tropical rainforest and pristine rivers with unique wildlife including the giant ant eater, giant beavers, jaguars and a plethora of birdlife. Collectively, they are often referred to as "The Guianas". The colonial capitals are

all gems. In fact, Paramaribo – Suriname's capital – with its beautiful timber buildings in the old town, is UNESCO-listed. Iles du Salut (or Devils Island as it is more widely known), where the book Papillon is set, is not to be missed. Georgetown,

French Guiana's Space Centre and Rainforest River lodges are also highlights of the trip.

25 DAYS Bangladesh, the Land of Bengal, is a South Asian country marked by lush greenery and many waterways. It is one of the most densely populated countries on the planet with over 150 million inhabitants living in a fascinating way with their environment. About half the total area of the country is no higher than 10m above sea level, which has led to a unique river-based way of life. The Ganges and Brahmaputra are the two main rivers of Bangladesh, carrying tonnes of silt from the mighty Himalayas. Apart from these two rivers, there are hundreds more comprising a very wide and complex river system.

Bangladesh is home to the largest mangrove forest in the world, the Sundarbans, best explored as the locals do: by boat. The hilly areas of the North and South-East are lush green landscapes of terraced tea plantations, occupied by smaller tribal groups. The capital city Dhaka, with nearly 17 million people, is a gloriously noisy and chaotic place, bubbling warm and welcoming, and with tourism still in its infancy, there are wonderful opportunities to get to know the locals. The Kingdom of Bhutan, known to the locals as Druk Yul, the Land of the Thunder Dragon, is a small landlocked nation in the Himalayas. Mainly due to its physical location, Bhutan was never colonised or conquered and retains its strong sense of national identity. Nearly three quarters of the country is covered in forest. Its highest peak, Kulu Kangri, is over 7,500 metres.

The country's population is very small at just 700,000. Most are Bhote Buddhists and ethnic Nepalese. The Taktsang monastery (known as Tigers Nest) is the country's best known icon but there are many more highlights on offer. While Bhutan may be one of the least developed societies, it may just be one of the happiest. The Gross National Happiness philosophy developed by ruler King Jigme Singye Wangchuk measures the wellbeing and happiness of the people, rather than material wealth measurements. If you're the sort of traveller who enjoys connecting with friendly locals, in a place where you're unlikely to bump into many tourists, then this is the trip for you.



The Southwestern corner of Western Australia is a pocket of lush green forests, farmland, rivers and a rugged coastline contrasting the stark landscapes of the rest of the state. Fertile soils provide foodies with the best fresh produce and world-class wineries, while its waters are rich with marine life.


