






THE CAUCASUS AZERBAIJAN, GEORGIA AND ARMENIA

At the crossroads of Asia and Eastern Europe, between the Black Sea and the Caspian Sea, the Caucasus is a unique travel destination. Few tourists visit this fascinating region but those who do are struck by its beauty, culture and history. On this trip, you'll pass snow-capped mountains, glaciers and gorges; dine with local families; and explore rock-hewn villages, mosques and UNESCO World Heritage-listed monasteries and churches.

Azerbaijan is a country boasting a history that dates back to prehistoric times and evidence of stone-age settlements. From the dynamic capital city of Baku to charming villages filled with stone buildings and cobblestone streets, to the ancient city Sheki, it is a country of contrasts. Azerbaijan was an important part of the Great Silk Route, and nowadays its economy is based on the abundance of oil and gas reserves. It is home to the UNESCO World Heritage-listed rock art site Gobustan and is the birthplace of the ancient Zoroastrian religion.

Georgia has an ancient culture and a unique alphabet found nowhere else in the world. Over the centuries all her neighbours have coveted over her land. Turks, Persians, Mongols, Arabia and the Russians have invaded and periodical civil war has also left its mark. But nowadays, it is a peaceful country becoming known for its quality wines and spectacular scenery. The capital, Tbilisi, has a modern European vibe, with cosy cafes, art galleries and theatres. Yet, leave the city and it may feel like travelling in medieval times, amongst palaces, castles, fortresses and rock-hewn villages. The UNESCO World Heritage-listed ancient capital Mtskheta sits at the confluence of the Aragvi River, and its 11th-century Svetitskhoveli Cathedral is where Christ's robe was buried. Admire the views of snow-capped mountains, gorges and glaciers as we travel through the country and the higher Caucasus Mountain range, reaching heights of over 5,000 metres.

This fascinating region has been overlooked by travellers for too long. Now is the time to visit, as it emerges as a destination for adventurous travellers.



Departure, Friday 29th August IN TRANSIT

Depart Australia for Baku, the capital city of Azerbaijan. Flights are to be confirmed but will likely be made through Doha with Qatar.

Day 1, Saturday 30th August

On arrival, we'll be met at the airport and transferred to the hotel, where we stay three nights. After checking in, we'll enjoy a tour of the old city, beginning with a visit to Highland Park, located on a



hill in the western part of the city. This is the best place to view the city and Baku Bay. Next, we'll visit the Old City's fortified walls, historic buildings and narrow cobbled streets. Guests will

appreciate the main attractions of the Old Town, including the Palace of the Shirvanshah, the city's symbol - Maiden Tower, Karvansarays, mosques, preserved old walls and numerous labyrinths. You'll appreciate the full flavour and historical value of Baku and its citizens. There's a welcome dinner planned at a local restaurant. $\ensuremath{\textit{D}}$

Day 2, Sunday 31st August GOBUSTAN AND HEYDAR ALIYEV CENTRE

After breakfast, we'll drive to Gobustan. The reserve is well known for its perfectly preserved rock paintings - petroglyphs - a kind of artistic "archive" of human evolution on the Earth. Gobustan Rocks reflect the history of this region for nearly 15,000 years - from the end of the era of the Upper Paleolithic till the Middle Ages. Azerbaijani scientists have found. described and studied more than 4,000 petroglyphs (rock painting in the stone carving art), and this important work continues. You'll also visit the interactive museum with the same name, where, with the help of special programs and multimedia touch screens, you will hear more about the flora and fauna of Gobustan. After this visit, drive to the fascinating mini mud volcanos just north of the city, heading back to Baku. The tour visits the Heydar Aliyev Center, built by world-famous architect Zaha Hadid. An internationally recognised architectural work, the building of the Heydar Aliyev Center has become a signature landmark of modern Baku due to its innovative and cutting-edge design. Dinner at a local restaurant tonight. B/D





Day 3, Monday 1st September BAKU – GUBA – KHYNALIQ – KRASNAYA SLOBODA After an early breakfast, you'll

head north for a fascinating day trip. Guba is located in the northeastern slopes of Mount Shahdag in Greater Caucasus, 600 m above sea level, on the banks of the river Gudial, 168 km from Baku. Even though Guba is now a small town, in the Middle Ages, it was the capital of Guba Khanate, and a thriving centre. Krasnaya Sloboda is a unique place in the Caucasus, where 3,000 mountain Jews live compactly. This settlement has existed in Guba since the 13th century. In 1742, the local ruler Falihan permitted the Jews, persecuted by Islamic fundamentalists, to settle on the left bank of the mountain river Kudial-chai opposite the city itself. There are seven synagogues in the village. After lunch, a trip to the Khynalyg village (visiting Khynalyg is possible only under appropriate weather conditions). Khynalig is located high in the Caucasus mountains, at 2350 m above sea level in the Guba region. Khynalygs have been living in the Caucasus for thousands of years. The village is inhabited by 2,000 light-skinned, blue-eyed people who consider themselves descendants of the Prophet Noah. Guests can take a short walk around the village. In good weather, the slopes offer a view of the snow-capped peaks of the Caucasus. Then, drive to Baku for dinner at the hotel. B/D

Day 4, Tuesday 2nd September BAKU – LAHIJ – SHEKI

Check out from the hotel after breakfast and drive to the Northern regions of Azerbaijan. We head northwest of Azerbaijan through the Caucasus Mountains. Dense forest mountains replaced the dry landscape around Baku. We'll visit Lahij village in Ismayilly district (subject to weather conditions). Most of the 2,000 people living in Lahij are involved in ancient crafts such as engraved copper work and carpet weaving. In the mid-19th century, there were more than 200 workshops in Lahij. Traders discovered Lahij crafts many centuries ago and sold them for high prices at bazaars in Baghdad [now Iraq], Shiraz [now Iran] and other Middle Eastern cities. Lunch is at the local guest house in Lahij. Then, arrive in Sheki and have a tea stop with the locals. In Sheki, visit the Albanian church, which is located in Kish village. As the legend says, this church is the first Christian church built not only on the territory of Caucasian Albania but in general - in the whole of Transcaucasia. Dinner at a local restaurant near the hotel. Check-in for one night in Sheki. B/L/D

Day 5, Wednesday 3rd September

SHEKI CITY TOUR – GEORGIAN BORDER –

Check out the hotel after breakfast for a tour of Sheki - one of Azerbaijan's most famous and ancient places. Situated at 700 m (2297 ft.) above sea level, the city, like an amphitheatre, is surrounded by mountains and forests of oak trees. This ancient city was long famed as a silk Centre and an essential stop on the Great Silk Route. We'll start our Sheki tour by visiting the 18th-century Khan's summer palace (entry) with magnificent frescos and exquisite stained-glass work. We will visit "Shebeke" workshop, where the tourists will meet with local craftsmen who will tell us about "Shebeke" making. Afterwards, we will visit the workshop of a Sheki baklava maker, a sweet famous all over Azerbaijan. At around 2.00 pm, we'll be dropped at the Georgian Border to be collected by our new guide. Be prepared for a 1km walk through nomans land with your luggage.

Next, we drive to Sighnaghi. The city was established in the XVIII century and was fortified with a 5 km long wall, which is still evident today. Modern Sighnaghi is a beautiful architectural site that uses Georgian and Italian design. You can walk in the parks and cobbled streets, aligned with the local handicraft studios and markets. Visit a local wine cellar, where we can taste different varieties of Georgian wines. Then on to Tbilisi. Dinner at a local restaurant. *B/D*

Day 6, Thursday 4th September

This morning brings a tour of Tbilisi, including the National Museum and the Sameba Cathedral, the largest in the Caucasus. Discover the fashionably cozy cafes and art galleries of Shardeni Street before we visit the cosmopolitan and arty scene of Rustaveli Avenue. In the afternoon, a visit to Old Tbilisi. (Note, you can explore Tbilisi at leisure when returning. Dinner is at a local restaurant, and then we'll take a short walking tour across the Freedom Bridge to see the lights at night. **B/D**

Day 7, Friday 5th September KAZBEGI VIA MTSKHETA AND ANANURI

After breakfast, take a short drive to Mtskheta, a UNESCO-listed



site and an ancient capital of the Georgian Kingdom from the 3rd Century BC. We will also visit the magnificent C11th Svetitskhoveli Cathedral, where Christ's robe was buried, and the C6th Jvari



monastery sitting high on a rocky mountaintop. The stunning drive along the Tergi River leads to Kazbegi, which passes Ananuri Castle and Jinvali water reservoir. Dinner is planned back at the hotel in Kazbegi. *B/D*



Day 8, Saturday 6th September KAZBEGI

After breakfast, we'll transfer to 4WD vehicles to drive to Gergeti Trinity Church, located at an

altitude of 2170m. This is one of the great sights of Georgia. Weather permitting, catch a glimpse of Mt Kazbegi, one of the highest mountains of Eurasia at 5047m. Afterwards, drive to the Dariali Gorge and take a short trek to Gveleti Waterfall. Return to the hotel for a free afternoon. Dinner is at the hotel. *B/D*

Day 9, Sunday 7th September KAZBEGI – KUTAISI VIA GORI AND UPLISTSIKHE

If you don't mind rising early, grab your camera and, weather permitting, take a photo of the sun rising on Mt Kazbegi. After breakfast, we'll drive to the 11thcentury city of Gori and visit the Joseph Stalin Museum plus his personal train. We'll also see the home where he was raised. Then we'll drive to nearby Uplistsikhe, an ancient rock-hewn town known as "The Lord's Fortress". Built high on the rocky left bank of the Mtkvari River, some structures date from 2000 BC through to the late Middle Ages, and it is also notable for its unique combination of different styles of rock-cut cultures. (Some of the walking here is a little steep, and there is also a tunnel to walk through (if open), so for those who don't like enclosed spaces, you may want to wait at the café below. Later, we arrived in Kutaisi, the country's second-largest city and former capital. Check in to the hotel for a twonight stay and dinner. B/D

Day 10, Monday 8th September KUTAISI

We'll tour Kutaisi this morning, visiting the Bagrati Cathedral and impressive Byzantine Gelati Monastery, a 12th-century masterpiece of the Georgian Golden Age that is now a UNESCO World Heritage site. Archaeological evidence indicates Kutaisi functioned as the capital of the ancient Colchis kingdom. At the end of 2012, it resumed its role when it was re-established as Georgia's governing city with the new parliament building designed by Spanish architect Alberto Domingo Kabo. *B/D*

Day 11, Tuesday 9th September KUTAISI – MESTIA VIA ENGURI DAM

After breakfast, we will drive to the Samegrelo Region and visit the Martvili Canyon, one of Georgia's best nature sites. 700 m long stone paved circular route starts from Martvili Canyon visitor centre and crosses the Dadiani historical trail. There are two bridges, three platform views and a historical 30 steps stair constructed of large limestone boulders. Next, we take a boat tour in Martvili Canyon before heading to the Svaneti region, one of the tour's highlights. The scenic drive to Mestia in the Svaneti region of high mountains and glaciers is stunning. (Consider some snacks for the road trip, as there aren't many places to stop for lunch). Before arriving in Mestia, we'll visit the Enguri Dam at 271 metres, the second-highest concrete arch dam in the world and create a reservoir in the picturesque gorges of Samegrelo and Svaneti mountains. Check in to the hotel for dinner and a fournight stay. B/D

Day 12, Wednesday 10th September MESTIA

After breakfast, the group will drive to the Chalaadi glacier (20 minutes from the hotel) for a challenging walk to



see nature at its best (about 3.5 hours return, with some sections rated hard). This walk is only for active travellers. Lunch is arranged at a local restaurant in Mestia, and the afternoon is free before dinner. Those not up to the walk can stay at the lodge and meet the group for lunch or visit the small township. *B/L/D*

Day 13, Thursday 11th September DAY TRIP TO USHGULI

Cameras ready! Today is another major highlight of the trip. The group will take the most scenic drive by 4WD Jeeps to UNESCO-listed Ushguli, a community of four villages at 2200m, considered Europe's most populated place. We'll have lunch at a local guesthouse and learn how to make the local specialty of cheese and kubdari. Visit the local ethnographic museum before driving to Nakipari to visit the 12thcentury St George's church. If you have the chance, take a walk through a few of the villages and meet some of the locals. On the way back to Mestia, drive to Tetnuldi ski resort, which offers wonderful views. Return to Mestia for dinner. *B/L/D*

Day 14, Friday 12th September

This morning, we'll visit Mestia's Ethnographic and Machubi Museums. In the afternoon, take the cable car (weather permitting) to the top of Hatsvali Mountain ski resort and enjoy the panoramic

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mountain views – this is a great option for lunch (at your own expense). There may be an hour or two of free time in Mestia, and a great tip is to watch a local Georgian movie in the small café/cinema just 5 minutes from the centre of town, overlooking the river. Your guide will provide details. *B/D*



Day 15, Saturday May 13th September MESTIA – BATUMI Today we'll drive to Batumi, located on the Black Sea and arguably Georgia's most beautiful city.

(It's almost opposite Istanbul if you look due west). We'll stop for a pick-up lunch at Zugdidi (or nearby). Of the several sculptural artworks of particular interest is the "Ali and Nino" statue by Georgian sculptor Tamara Kvesitadze – two towering human forms made out of metallic discs and constantly on the move. The figures draw closer and kiss before continuing their path and passing through one another, eventually parting and facing in opposite directions, tragically representing a Muslim boy and Christian girl separated by the invasion of Russia. Check in to the hotel for a two-night stay with dinner at a local restaurant. If you're up for it, stroll around the hotel to get a feel for the city at night. **B/D**

Day 16, Sunday 14th September BATUMI

This morning, we'll stroll Batumi's busy boulevard, a park strip fronting the main beach. Its trees, paths, fountains, cafes, and beach bars are the life and soul of Batumi. We'll also walk through the lovely botanical gardens, which will take about 2 hours (up and down hills), and take in some lovely views over the Black Sea. Later, enjoy a short boat trip on the Black Sea to view the city from the water. *B/D*

Day 17, Monday 15th September BORJOMI

Today is mainly a day of transfers. After breakfast, we'll drive to Borjomi. On arrival at our hotel, check-in



and stroll around the small township, including the gardens and waterfall. Make sure you try the "unusual" warm spring water. About 3.5 km from the entrance of Borjomi Central Park, you

will discover a treasure of nature - Hot Sulphur Pools between the forest and the rocky river. Sulphur Pools - an average temperature of 32-38 C° - are very beneficial for health. The territory has free Wi-Fi, a café-bar, changing rooms and showers. *B/D*

Day 18, Tuesday 16th September BORJOMI TO AKHALTSIKHE AND VARDZIA CAVE

After breakfast, we'll travel to Vardzia, a rock-hewn complex on the bank of the river Mtkvari, founded in the 12th and 13th centuries. Initially planned as a town fortress, the complex became a well-fortified monastery that played a significant role in the country's political, cultural, educational and spiritual

life. In the middle of the complex is a Church of Assumption, richly decorated with mural paintings. Note that there is some uphill and cave walking, which could be considered



challenging and not for everyone. (Even if the local minibus takes you up the hill, there will be about 500 metres to walk, mostly uphill). After the excursion, we'll have lunch at a local restaurant in Vardzia. Then we'll drive to Akhaltsikhe and visit the Rabati fortress, the town's main sight. Return to Borjomi. *B/L/D*

Day 19, Wednesday 17th September BORJOMI TO TBILISI

After breakfast, transfer from Borjomi back to Tbilisi, which takes about 2 hours. Today is free to enjoy the sights of Tbilisi or to shop and mix it with the locals in the area right near the hotel. There are many things to see and do, and your tour leader will provide options. Note that today is at your leisure and not guided or hosted. Dinner at a local restaurant. *B/D*

Day 20, Thursday 18th September TBILISI TO BAVRA BORDER

After breakfast, we'll transfer to the Armenia border. Today is mainly a day of driving. After border formalities, there will be a change of transport and guide. Arrive at Bavra late in the afternoon. (Note: there is a 500-metre walk into "no man's land" between borders, and you must carry your luggage along a bumpy road as there is no transport option).

WELCOME TO ARMENIA

In the afternoon, we'll arrive in Gyumri - the second largest city in Armenia and an important cultural centre in the late 19th and early 20th century. We'll see the historical centre of Alexandropol, which has many traditional 19th-century houses, and visit a museum in one of them. Check into the hotel (which is ultra-kitsch) for a lovely dinner and an overnight stay. **B/D**





Day 21, Friday 19th September **TO YEREVAN VIA EJMIATSIN**

Breakfast starts around 8.30 am at this hotel, so we suggest you walk through the local

markets near the hotel if you are an early riser. Chat with the friendly locals with some hand signals and a smile. If you need currency, ask the hotel manager for the local bank manager to come to the hotel - they offer great service. After breakfast, we'll drive to Ejmiatsin and visit the main cathedral and Hripsime church. Ejmiatzin means "the coming of the only begotten" because it is said Jesus descended here from heaven to show where he wanted a church to be built. Continue to beautiful Yerevan and check into the hotel for a three-night stay. Time permitting, stroll around the hotel as it's very safe and has many shops, cafés and parks. Dinner is at a traditional restaurant where you can taste national Armenian cuisine. B/D

. Day 22, Saturday 20th September YEREVAN AND EXCURSION TO GEGHARD **AND GARNI TEMPLE**

Today, we'll take an orientation drive around Yerevan city and visit the manuscript museum, home to one of the world's richest depositories of medieval documents and books spanning many subjects and in many languages. Make the short drive to the Genhard Monastery, whose name derives from the legendary lance used to pierce the body of Christ and housed here for centuries. Though the exact foundation of the



monastery is unknown, the present complex was built in the mid-13th century. Enjoy a choir performance before walking along the canyon, past the beautiful 9th-century basalt

bridge over the Azat River. Visit Garni, a pagan Temple built in the 1st century. Then we'll stop for a late lunch at a local family's home (Abelyan's House), and a demonstration showing how they make their delicious bread! Return to Yerevan for dinner at a local restaurant. B/L/D

Day 23, Sunday 21st September YEREVAN AND SURROUNDS

We'll start today's tour of Yerevan city with a short drive to Khor Vira Monastery, where Gregory the Illuminator, who introduced Christianity to Armenia, was imprisoned for about 13 years. Enjoy the spectacular view of the sacred Ararat Mountain, an immortal symbol of Armenia (now on Turkish soil). Back in town, visit the history museum in Republic Square to gain a good general understanding of the history and culture of Armenia and its people. Then we'll drive to the Genocide museum, which can be very emotional but a must-see as it's a significant part of the country's recent history. Back mid-afternoon to the hotel. Dinner is at leisure tonight, with many great local options. A good tip would be to walk down to the square past the opera house, where you have many choices! B

Day 24, Monday 22nd September TO DILIJAN VIA SEVAN AND GOSHAVANK

Depart Yerevan for Lake Sevan, one of the world's largest high-altitude lakes at 2000 metres above sea level and a popular vacation spot. Discover the beautiful church on the hilltop (about



250 steps up). Then, stop at a local bakery to buy lunch. Visit the local museum in Dilijan to learn about the region's history before departing for the impressive 12th-13th century Goshavank monastery. Dinner tonight is at the hotel. B/D

..... Day 25, Tuesday 23rd September HAGHPAT ALAVERDI AND YEREVAN

The first stop today is at the UNESCO-listed medieval Haghpat Monastery, built halfway up a hillside on a

mountain cirque when not wreathed in clouds, the views are lovely. The monastery's oldest Holy Cross Church structure was built before 1000 AD. Then, drive back to Yerevan. B/D



..... Day 26, Wednesday 24th September DEPARTURE

After breakfast, we'll transfer to the airport for the flight home to Australia, arriving home the following day. B
